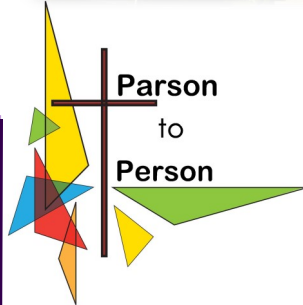

Advent and Christmas traditions are all important to us. We celebrate the season with timeless traditions. Some traditions are quite old.

1. The Christmas tree began as a German tradition as early as A.D. 700 and moved to England and America through immigrants.
2. The first manufactured Christmas Tree ornament was sold at Woolworth's in 1880. Martin Luther is credited with first decorating trees with candles in the sixteenth century. Calvin Coolidge ceremoniously lit the first outdoor tree at the White House in 1923.
3. Mistletoe has been used as a decoration for thousands of years, but because of its association with pagan rituals, the Church forbade its use in any form, suggesting holly as a substitute. The pointed leaves of the holly symbolize the thorns on Christ's crown and the red berries, the drops of his blood.
4. Christmas cards started in London in 1843 and in America in 1848. Today, about two billion Christmas cards are exchanged each year in the United States.

Epworth's Foster Care Program is quickly growing as individuals and families in Columbia and the surrounding areas are stepping up to open their hearts and homes to children in need. The program currently has fourteen licensed foster homes and just as many completing the process. While not everyone may be able to foster, everyone can do something to impact the foster care community. No matter your age, ability, or schedule, your passions and talents can make an impact. This was recently proven true by five special girls, who unprompted, wanted to do something to help foster children. Their "something" came in the form of lemonade stands. Sisters Vivienne, Lucy

Katherine, and Betsy Fonte are the daughters of Chris and Katie Fonte who are currently in the process of becoming a licensed foster family with our program. They set up their stand weekly throughout the summer to bring awareness to their Rosewood neighbors. **Mary Scott Handell, daughter of Epworth Foster Parents Kevin and Katy Handell**, along with her friend, set up their stand and created a colorful sign with a powerful message- "You are not alone." # MOVIE NIGHT

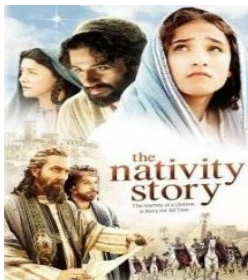
Don't miss this **perfect** addition to the **Advent season**—two wonderful movies that tell the story of the birth of our Savior.

### The Origins of the Love Feast

The first Love Feast was served in Germany on August 13, 1727, following the renewal of the Moravian Church. The Love Feast, or Agape Meal, is a Christian fellowship meal recalling the meals Jesus shared with disciples during his ministry and expressing the koinonia (community, sharing, fellowship) enjoyed by the family of Christ. Although its origins in the early church are closely interconnected with the origins of the Lord's Supper, the two services

became quite distinct and should not be confused with each other.

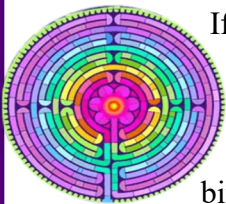
The Love Feast is styled after the common meal partaken in love and fellowship by the early church as described in the book of Acts:

*And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship to the breaking of bread and the prayers. Acts. 2:42*

The Love Feast nourishes the soul, give us pause and inspire; and transport us to sacred realms and add beauty to our often complicated lives. John Wesley first experienced it among the Moravians in Savannah, Georgia. His diary notes: *"After evening prayers, we joined with the Germans in one of their love-feasts. It was begun and ended with thanksgiving and prayer, and celebrated in so decent and solemn a manner as a Christian of the apostolic age would have allowed to be worthy of Christ."*

John Wesley instituted this service in the Methodist church after the Moravian pattern:

During the love feast a small meal of a bun and mug of coffee is served. "A simple, ritual meal where hymns are sung, special music shared, and scripture is read." The Christmas Love Feast is made special with the addition of candles, lit at the end of the service as a reminder of the light of Christ's love.



If you long for a moment's peace and quiet in this sometimes hectic season; if you seek an alternative path to prayer and meditation; if you're curious and seeking, then come and walk with us and discover the joy the Christ Child brings.

When our labyrinth is unfolded and in place -- and lit only by battery-operated candles and a bit of natural light through the windows Wesley Hall is transformed into a special place.

Labyrinths are an ancient form of 'walking meditation', which flowered in medieval times with the building of the great gothic cathedrals in Europe. Our labyrinth is canvas, measures 36' across, and is a replica of the famous "Chartres Labyrinth" built 800 years ago at Chartres Cathedral in France.

According to [Veriditas](#), an organization that promotes labyrinths worldwide, labyrinths are used to "quiet the mind, recover balance in life, and encourage meditation, insight, self-reflection, stress reduction, and to discover innovation and celebration. The practice of labyrinth walking integrates the body with the mind & mind with the spirit."

#### Guidelines for a walk:


People of all faiths, ages and abilities are welcome to walk or sit quietly in contemplation. Please begin your walk 30 minutes before closing time. A finger labyrinth is available for those who can't walk.

Quiet your mind. Allow yourself to find the pace your body wants to go, walking quickly with prayer, or a slow meditative walk. Since the path is two-way, those going in will meet those coming out. You may "pass" people or let others step around you. Do what feels natural. Walk the labyrinth with an open mind and an open heart.

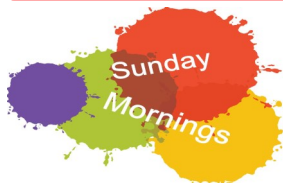
