





"THE END" IS ALWAYS GOOD NEWS!

During those years when I was serving Grace Community UMC in Fort Mill, South Carolina, I took advantage of my close proximity to both sporting and fine arts events. There were several Sunday evenings and/or Monday nights when I would head over with friends to Bank of America stadium to watch the Carolina Panthers in action! Likewise, there were several Thursday, Friday, or Saturday nights when I enjoyed a multiplicity of performances, concerts,

plays, and stage productions at the Charlotte venues of the Belk Theater, the McGlohon Theater, the Knight Theater, the Booth Playhouse, Ovens Auditorium, and the Levine Center for the Arts.

I remember one performance in particular that I attended on a Friday night. The reason this production stands out so vividly in my mind, is because it included audience participation! That is to say, the actors performed the story on stage ... all the way up to the climax. But then, as we all sat there on the edges of our seats, wondering "how it was all going to end", the main character of the production came out on stage and started asking the audience questions! Based on the feedback we gave, all of the actors then returned to the stage and finished the production in the way we had written it! How cool is that!

As the crowd exited the theater that night following the conclusion of the production, I overheard many conversations among guests who were saying to each other ... "I wonder how the story will end tomorrow night!"

You know, as we move into the 18th month of trying to live Christian lives in the midst of a global pandemic, I would guess that we are all mumbling amongst ourselves that very same question, "I wonder how the story will end tomorrow night". But I bet our "suspected answer" is not nearly as exciting as it was when I participated in that audience feedback exercise at Charlotte's McGlohon Theater! Masks on ... masks off; vaccinations climbing ... vaccinations falling; stores and restaurants reopening ... stores and restaurants closing; events scheduled ... events cancelled; schools opened ... schools closed; "I wonder how the story will end tomorrow night"?


Interesting. But if you really think about it, that is actually the "typical storyline" for the lives of those of us who call ourselves Christians. If you are a follower of the Christian calendar, you would know that right now, we are almost exactly in the middle of that season known as Pentecost ... a season where, through our weekly Bible lessons, we follow the ups and downs of the post-resurrection church of Jesus Christ. And of course, one of the "main characters" on the stage during Pentecost, was the Apostle Paul.

In reflecting upon our knowledge of the New Testament, as the book of Acts closes we are left with a very real sense that "the story" is not yet over. And hence, we find ourselves asking that same question of the day ... "how will this story end?" The last few verses of the book of Acts gives us some insight into the answer to that question, as we read about the Apostle Paul spending two solid years preaching the gospel from his very own rented house in Rome. "Boldly and without hindrance Paul preached the kingdom of God and taught about the Lord Jesus Christ" (Acts 28:30-31).

Isn't that an inspiring climax to the book of Acts? And notice, if you will, what is implied from that passage regarding Paul's enthusiasm, Paul's courage, Paul's willingness to be a witness to the gospel even under difficult circumstances. And let's not miss, as well, Paul's refusal to be intimidated by the abundant negative and critical voices which





Kendall and baby Hadley Rae. He will return to LUMC during the 6 week phase of wife Kendall's maternity leave. In October, October 13 through December 22, Pastor Jim will go back on leave for the remaining 10 weeks of his allotted time of paternity leave.

According to the 2016 United Methodist Book of Discipline, Paragraph 355 - "maternity or paternity leave, not to exceed one fourth of a year, will be available and shall be granted by the bishop and the cabinet, and the executive committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry to any local pastor, provisional member, associate member, or clergy member in full connection who so requests it at the birth or arrival of a child into the home for purposes of adoption; 355:2 - during the leave, the clergy member's annual conference relations will remain unchanged, and the health and welfare benefit plans will remain in force; 355:3 - a maternity or paternity leave of up to one quarter of a year will be considered as an uninterrupted appointment for pension purposes; 355:4 - compensation will be maintained for no less than the first eight weeks of leave; 355:5 during the leave time, pastoral responsibility for the church or churches involved will be handled through consultation with the committee on pastor parish relations of the local church(es) and the district superintendent."

Arrangements have been made for pulpit supply during Pastor Jim's absence (please see article below entitled: "A New Face In Town"). Please keep the NEW Rogers' family in prayer as they bond with one another and celebrate daily the consistent miracles our good God is constantly bestowing upon us!

As mentioned in a previous article regarding Pastor Jim's paternity leave, it is our blessing to announce the pulpit supply assigned to LUMC during Pastor Jim's absence!

The Rev. Cathy Jamieson along with the Cabinet and the Bishop of the South Carolina United Methodist Conference have assigned **Rev. Laurie Brandes** as pulpit supply for LUMC for the following Sundays: August 22, August 29, October 17, October 24, October 31, November 7, November 21, November 28, December 5, December 12, and December 19, 2021. Rev. Cathy Jamieson will serve as pulpit supply on Sunday, November 14, prior to LUMC's 2021 Charge Conference at Noon on Sunday, November 14.

Staff Parish Relations Committee News Continues

Our LUMC Minister of Youth and Young Adults is taking on a new ministry in Paris, France! Rev. Elizabeth Murray will become the Associate Pastor of Youth and Young Adults at the American Church in Paris. As

Pastor Elizabeth gets closer to her departure date, the LUMC Staff Parish Relations Committee wanted to inform you of some important upcoming dates throughout the month of September.



American Church in Paris

Pastor Elizabeth's final day in the office will be Thursday, September 9 and the last Sunday Pastor Elizabeth will worship with us is Sunday, September 12. Pastor Elizabeth will then begin a 30-day paid Renewal Leave until October 13.

The 2016 United Methodist Book of Discipline, Paragraph 350, offers the following information regarding Renewal Leave: "throughout their careers, clergy shall engage in continuing education for ministry, professional development, and spiritual formation and growth in order to lead the church in fulfilling the mission of making disciples for Jesus Christ. This shall include carefully developed personal programs of study augmented periodically by involvement in organized educational and spiritual growth activities. These practices embody the Wesleyan emphasis on lifelong growth in faith, fostered by personal spiritual

practices and participation in covenant communities. Each annual conference, through the chairs of the Clergy Orders and Fellowship or other leaders designated by the bishop, shall provide spiritual enrichment opportunities and covenant groups for deacons, elders, and local pastors; 350:2 - a clergy member's continuing education and spiritual growth program shall include professional formation leaves at least one week each year and may include at least one month during one year of every quadrennium. Such leaves shall not be considered as part of the minister's vacations and shall be planned in consultation with their charges or other agencies to which they are appointed as well as the bishop, district superintendent, and annual conference continuing education committee; 350:3 - a clergy member may request a formational and spiritual growth leave of up to six months while continuing to hold an appointment in the local church. Such leaves are available to clergy members who have held full time appointments for at least six years. Such a leave shall be with the approval of the committee on pastor-parish relations, the church council, and the district superintendent. Annual conferences are encouraged to assist with pulpit supply and other temporary support for such leaves; 350:4 - financial arrangements for continuing education as part of one's professional development, formation, and spiritual growth shall be negotiated in the following manner: (a) for elders and local pastors it shall be done in consultation with the district superintendent and the committee on pastor-parish relations; (b) for deacons, with an appropriate supervisory body; (c) for district superintendents, with the district committee on superintendency; (d) for conference staff, with the appropriate supervisory body; (e) for others in extension ministries or appointments beyond the local church, with the appropriate persons in their agency; 350:5 - clergy shall be asked by the district superintendent in the charge conference to report on their programs of continuing education, formation, and spiritual growth for the past year and plans for the year to come. The district superintendent shall also ask the local church to describe its provision for time and financial support of continuing education for ministry, professional development, formation and spiritual growth for the pastors, diaconal ministers, and deacons serving their primary appointment in that local church".

In response to Pastor Elizabeth's plans for transition, the LUMC Staff Parish Relations Committee is actively seeking a replacement for the staff role of Minister to Youth and Young Adults. The LUMC SPRC has posted an updated job description for the position of Minister to Youth and Young Adults; the LUMC SPRC is currently reviewing applications which have already been received; and interviews with viable candidates are pending.

Please keep Pastor Elizabeth, the LUMC SPRC, potential candidates interested in this position, as well as our entire church family in your prayers, as we are led by the Spirit to move through this transition as smoothly and productively as possible.

Our teachers, school nurses and staff are dealing with an unimaginable year! Covid is a worry everyday— worrying what students are able to be in class, what students are quarantined. How to make sure they all get the lessons they need. Please keep our schools in your prayers.



Dear LUMC Family and Friends -

As you are certainly aware, the surge of the Delta variant of Covid-19 is most definitely upon us. However, as a result of our August 5, 2021 meeting of the LUMC Coronavirus Committee, we presently have no plans to return to any prior restrictions nor to a more stringent church shut-down. This is, in part, because those who are vaccinated are not exhibiting life threatening cases of Covid-19. Consequently, as of August 10, 2021, we will continue to practice the best options possible for safety and protection - thorough hand washing, the wearing of face coverings (recommended), and social distancing (when/where possible). Additionally, please get vaccinated if you can. As we continue to host our in-person worship celebrations as well as any other LUMC adult group gatherings, while it is optional, you are strongly encouraged to wear a face covering for your protection as well as for the welfare of those around you. As needs warrant, further decisions will be made to protect everyone.

Concerning our LUMC Children's Ministry, we will continue to practice our current requirement of the wearing of face coverings by all volunteers in all settings/activities involving children who are not eligible for immunization due to their age. This MANDATE includes: Sunday School, LUMC Pre-school, Break-out Kids, as well as any other Children's Ministries activities on the LUMC campus.

At LUMC Preschool, the wearing of face coverings by all teachers/adults/parents is required. The wearing of face coverings by LUMC Preschool children will be at the discretion of their families, due to their age and ineligibility for the vaccine at this time.

Concerning our LUMC Youth Ministry, while the wearing of face coverings is **strongly recommended**, they are not required. Many of our Junior High youth are not yet able to be vaccinated due to their age and hence we **strongly encourage** the wearing of masks when in ministry with this group. This RECOMMENDATION includes: Sunday School, UMYF gatherings, as well as any other Youth Ministries activities on the LUMC campus.

Concerning our LUMC Scouting ministry, the aforementioned MANDATE for children under the age of vaccine eligibility will apply; and the aforementioned recommendation for youth will apply.

As we continue to be in ministry together during these challenging times, please use your best judgement regarding these precautionary practices, and stay safe.




